Leaves and Harmful Algal Blooms

Now that raking season is approaching, keep your lawn scraps for a backyard compost. Burning leaves or sweeping them into storm drains both cause a large amount of pollution. You may be thinking, how can leaves cause pollution if they are nature? If too many enter the waterways and when they break down, the nutrients they release are excess and create an algal bloom.



Algal blooms kill the animals and removes oxygen from the water. Harmful algal blooms (HABs) can happen in freshwater and salt-water. Taken directly from the CDC,

“Harmful algal blooms are the rapid growth of algae or cyanobacteria that can cause harm to people, animals, or the local ecology. Harmful algae or cyanobacteria can look like foam, scum, paint, or mats on the surface of water and can be different colors.” In case you are unsure of how much “greens” and “browns” to add, read this helpful article:




Holiday Trouble
